IDENTITY IN A GLOBAL VILLAGE

NEBA: Adamu, each time I listen to a news item on globalization, I always go away with impression that our forefathers were a very intelligent and wise set of people.

ADAMU: I cannot see the link.

NEBA: It's very obvious; you have only refused to see it.

ADAMU: Show it to me then.

NEBA: Our forefathers lived by the policy, "one hand cannot tie a bundle". This simply meant that success had to be a collective effort. Can't you see that this is the principle on which the global village works?

ADAMU: You are right my brother. They were wise indeed. Come to think of it, do you not see that a person without a hand is useless in the global village?

NEBA: You've got it my dear. I have often told you that you are a smart boy. What constitutes "hands" in the global village then?

ADAMU: it is obvious. Your recognition in the global village is tied to your contribution to its success.

NEBA: You cannot belong if you go empty handed. You will be like that man who wants to tie a bundle without hands. In the global village, countries replace people and resources and skills replace hands.
